A HOME FOR BOOKS

A Beautiful Building, Well Planned and Well Constructed.

PEOPLE PRAISE EDIFICE

The \$10,000 public library building of Mooresville and Brown township, was formally opened to the public yesterday, January 27th, with appropriate exercises.

The building is located in the first block west of the public square on a lot 80x153 feet, on the north side of the street, and stands forty feet from the front of the lot.

The building is of the Elizabethan style of architecture, 56x36 ft, outside measurement. It is built of a vitrified, fire clay brick, four shades of tan, laid in dark brown mortar, with stone trimmings, and has timbered gables and a tile roof. The building is heated by steam heat and lighted by the semi-indirect lighting system. The reading room is furnished with three adult tables, three children's tables and two tables in the reference department. Shelving has been provided for 6000 books. The assembly room has a seating capacity of more than 200.

Charles Ferguson and Frank Marine, the general contractors, have not only complied with the architects specifications but have done excellent work throughout. They have taken great pride in making this building one of the very best \$10,000 buildings in the state.

Miss Carrie E. Scott, assistant state organizer, has been invaluable to the library board in many respects.
