MOORESVILLE HIGH SCHOOL.

This Institution, established by the liberality of all classes who felt the great need of such a school, is under the care of a Board of Trustees, (members of the Religious Society of Friends,) called the "Mooresville High School Association," and is under the immediate superintendence and oversight of a Board of Managers, elected by the Trustees from their number, who are vested with authority to exercise such control over the School and all its appendages as they may find necessary to preserve good order and promote the interests of the Institution.

OBJECT OF THE SCHOOL.

It is of a grade intermediate between common schools and colleges, and is designed to offer extended opportunities both to such as wish to prepare to attend college, and to such as do not wish to incur the expense and spend the time of a regular college course, yet wish to qualify themselves for teaching in the common schools, or for the common business of life.

THE PAST YEAR.

The School has just closed its second year, and although it has had some difficulties to conted with, yet the steady, successful, and correct advancement, both of those students who have attended the School from its opening, and of others whose attendance has been shorter, fully attests the advantages to be derived from the School.

THE NEXT YEAR.

The School will be continued during the ensuing year under the tuition of J. H. Stuart, A. B., as Principal, and Joseph Pool, his associate. The Principal has filled the position during the past two years to the entire satisfaction of the Board and the patrons, and his associate is an experienced and successful teacher.

SESSIONS AND PRICES.

The scholastic year will consist of thirty-nine weeks, divided into three sessions of thirteen weeks each:

The first session will open 9th month 29th, and close 12th month 25th, 1863; tuition \$7 50.

The second session will open 1st month 4th, and close 4th month 1st, 1864; tuition \$7 50.

The third session will open 4th month 11th, and close 7th month 8th, 1864; tuition \$7.00.

The tuition is to be paid in advance, and no deduction will be made except by reason of sickness of students themselves, and then not for less time than one week of continued inability, in which case an order will be made by the Board of Managers to the Treasurer to make such deduction, when the student or interested party shall have satisfied them that the claim is reasonable.

ADMISSION.

It is very desirable that students should enter the School at the beginning of the sessions, but they may enter at any time, and they will be charged according to the prescribed rates from that time to the close of the term. Any teacher who wishes to attend the School temporarily, during a time when he may not be employed in his calling, can have temporary admission by application to the Board of Managers.

QUALIFCATIONS FOR ADMISSION.

There is no primary department connected with the School, and it will be required of applicants for admission, to understand

spelling, reading and writing, so as to be able to progress with the studies they may enter upon without being retarded by a lack of knowlege in these branches. They will be required to understand the tables and the elementary principles of Arithmetic, and it is desired that they have a knowlege of the general outlines of Geography, and be able to name the parts of speech, and give the definitions of English Grammar.

GOVERNMENT.

The discipline is intended to be mild and liberal, but firm; as far as possible students are made to feel that they are the rightful guardians of their own character, and that upon them rests the responsibility of the influence which they may exert upon the School.

When, from any cause whatever, the influence of a student becomes hurtful to the school, he may be expelled by order of the Board of Managers.

Scriptural instruction will be imparted in the school; and whilst none will be required to observe any requisitions contrary to their religious profession, or the desire of their parents or guardians, it will be required of all to give as diligent attendance at the meetings for worship of the different religious societies of which they may be members as practicable, and to conduct themselves consistently and orderly during their attendance at the school.

APPARATUS, CABINET AND LIBRARY.

The School possesses some valuable chemical and philosophical apparatus as a neuclus for further acquisition. It is also desirable to make a cabinet collection from the various branches of natural science. Donations to either will be gratefully received. There is in the house a valuable Library of over 400 volumes, accessible to the students for a small fee.

LITERARY SOCIETY, &c.

There is an interesting and useful Literary Society in connection with the school, and under the same superintendence, which, hereafter, will hold its sessions on the afternoon of the last schoolday of each week. Its exercises are discussions, essays and declamations, designed to promote the mutual literary and moral instruction of the members.

Lectures on the various subjects of natural science, illustrated by experiments, will be delivered during the year.

The scope of instruction is as comprehensive as that of many colleges, but thoroughness is one of the leading features of the School, and the instruction will have special reference to preparing students for practical life. A public examination of all the classes will be held at the close of each session.

LOCATION.

The Institution is located in a healthy region, on a beautiful lot of ground, surrounded by a grove of native forest trees, and adjoining the town of Mooresville, 18 miles south-west of Indianapolis, and 7 miles south of Plainfield.

BOARDING.

Boarding can be readily obtained in good families at rates from \$1.50 to \$2.00 per week. Students can board themselves much cheaper by procuring rooms and furnishing their own accommodations.
