
Each year the students elect two members from their respective classes to represent their interests in school activities.





Looking into the Past Class History

In the fall of 1945 the doors of Mooresville High School were opened to sixty-six wide-eyed and bewildered freshmen with high hopes of attaining a secondary education. It was a gruelling test of our stamina, but we all survived a merciless initiation at the hands of the formidable seniors. To start us off on our four-year educational journey we chose the following class officers: Curtis Wilcher, president; John Mann, vice-president; Betty Jean Modlin, secretary-treasurer; Kathleen Crutchfield, historian; and Nick Cordray and Gertrude Gunnell, student council members. Miss Tanner and Mrs. Biggers were our class sponsors.

Fifty-seven of the freshman class returned for their sophomore year in quest of further knowledge. As leaders of our class during this crucial year we chose: Delbert Ross, president; Nick Cordray, vice-president; Gertrude Gunnell, secretary-treasurer; Kathleen Crutchfield, historian; and Iris Keltner and Curtis Wilcher, student council members. Mr. Bisesi and Miss Mulvihill were our class sponsors. The social highlight of the year for us was a "Backwards" party which our class sponsored for the high school.

The following year found fifty students still enrolled, with the following officers becoming real leaders: Curtis Wilcher, president; Mary Ann Sellars, vice-president; Iris Keltner, secretary-treasurer; Kathleen Crutchfield, historian; and Mike Forester and Gertrude Gunnell, junior representatives on the student council. As we had become upper classmen now, we were taking on more and more responsibility. The noon hours and football and basketball games kept us busy selling popcorn, hot dogs, soda pop, and other refreshments. The stage-minded members of our class demonstrated their dramatic ability in a three-act comedy entitled "A Little Honey." The last semester was spent in preparation for the junior-senior prom and reception. We were busy decorating, listening to bands, preparing menus, and attending to all the other details connected with this pleasant occasion, not the least of which was the crowning of the Prom Queen, Maxine Park.


In the fall of 1948, forty-four members of our original freshman group entered their year of distinction, the senior year. Our first act was one of revenge —the initiation of the freshmen—the occasion for which we had been waiting for three years. Much to the chagrin of the freshmen, we summoned up all the ingenuity and mischievousness in us in planning an initiation that equaled and perhaps excelled our own in halarious nonsense. Climaxing this two-day ordeal was a party in honor of the new full-fledged scholars. As leaders in this most important year of our high school career, we chose: Robert Madge, president; Mary Ann Sellars, vice-president; Betty Jean Modlin, secretary-treasurer; Mary Lou Varner, historian; and Mike Forester and Rosemary Van Hoy, senior members of the student council. Mr. Truax and Miss Dailey were our sponsors. As one of the many activities of this busy year we sponsored dances after football and basketball games, including a gala Halloween dance. In preparation for graduation we spent much time in selecting commencement invitations, having our pictures taken, and organizing and publishing our annual. Several members of the class attended College Day at Martinsville High School. The senior class, along with the junior class, took $\boldsymbol{\alpha}$ trip to Indianapolis and visited the State Legislature and other places of interest.

It was our pleasure this year as seniors to be feted by the juniors at the senior reception. Memories of the banquet and prom will linger long in our memories.

With mixed emotions we all looked forward to the final scene that was to find the curtain falling on our high school career—on four full years holding memories of pleasant associations and good times and of studies which had awakened our minds to the ways of wise and fruitful living.



SOCIAL STUDIES

These students are becoming acquainted with historical events in American History and the processes and problems of American democracy in the government and sociology class.

American history, a required course for juniors, is taught by Mr. Brack and Miss Gunderson. Seniors meet the requirement of two citizenship credits in the first semester government class and the second semester sociology class taught by Mr. Potter.

SCIENCE

Students who yearn to delve deep into the mysteries of chemistry and physics are welcomed to Mr. Finke's science classes. Those who are taking these courses learn about the properties and composition of matter in an effort to understand more readily the various functions of the world about us and the whys and wherefores of the realm of nature.

ADVANCED LANGUAGES

Advanced languages consist of the junior and senior English classes and the second year Latin class. Junior English is required, while senior English and Latin II are electives which prove very useful to the student who intends to go to college. English is also beneficial to the student who doesn't intend to further his education in college, as it assists him in gaining facility in expressing himself. This class is taught by Miss McCleary; second year Latin by Miss Rice.













INDUSTRIAL ARTS

The shop has taken its place among the other High School subjects and is recognized as a place to learn by doing. As the boys build their various projects they see their learning turn into concrete forms.

The shop is also very valuable to the school, as it does many jobs of repair and maintenance around our

school plant.

In order that students may learn the language of construction and industry, a course in Mechanical Drawing is also offered. This department is under the supervision of Mr. Truax.

FRESHMAN ENGLISH

In Miss Rice's class the freshmen are launched on their three-vear state required course in English. Aiming at increased command of oral and written expression, the freshmen English students, having familiarized themselves with the fundamentals of grammar, are given numerous opportunities to apply them in a practical way in composition work and oral activities. Familiarization with some of the world's noblest written expression is gained in a study of literature which is integrated with the other language activities throughout the year.

HOME ECONOMICS

What's cookin'? — Shall it be a cake, a dress, caring for the sick, or just caring for the home? All these and more are taught to the girls in our Home Economics department by Miss Sproat. Courses yielding enormous information in foods, clothing, home planning, home nursing, and others are offered girls who enroll in this department.

Miss Sproat, who is director of Girls' 4-H has a great number of girls enrolled who have won for themselves several honors.

GIRLS' PHYSICAL EDUCATION

"A sound mind in a sound body." With this as a motto, the girls' physical education department provides a variety of body-building activities including conditioning exercises, folk and ballroom dancing, numerous sports, and other activities. Many athletically minded girls, after completing the required year of gym, elect to pursue an advanced course of training in the physical education department, directed by Miss LaVerne Ostermeyer.

BOYS' PHYSICAL EDUCATION

Freshmen boys not only keep up in physical fitness but also derive a great deal of pleasure from basketball, baseball, and other sports which are played in this required subject for freshmen.

Mr. VanLiew directs the activities of this department.

COMMERCE

With the aid of Mrs. Jean Eggleston and Miss Marjorie Dailey, the commercial department offers typing, bookkeeping, and first and second year shorthand for all students interested in finding a place in the business world. Not only are the fundamentals of these subjects taught but also the essentials of business relationships.













SOPHOMORE ENGLISH

Sophomore students pursue at greater depth the fundamentals of expression begun in their freshman year, aiming at increased facility in the art of oral and written communication.

Students board the magic carpet of literature and travel back to the proud days of Rome to witness the assassination of Julius Caesar in the great Shakespearean drama and soar forward again to picturesque England where they become acquainted with a classic example of the novel in Silas Marner. This class is taught by Miss McCleary.

SOPHOMORE AND JUNIOR HISTORY

The great panorama of human events through the centuries is reviewed and brought to life in the world history and American history classes.

Wise students come armed with good arguments to this class, ready to defend their opinions in what we understand is often a quite animated and thought-provoking exchange of ideas.

World history, a sophomore elective course is taught by Mr. Potter, while the American history class, a course required for all juniors is taught by Mr. Brock and Miss Gunderson.

HEALTH

Of preeminent importance is a knowledge of good health habits. With the purpose in mind of acquiring such knowledge, the members of the sophomore health class study physiology and acquaint themselves with the ways of wholesome, healthful living.

This course is taught by Mr. Van Liew.



AGRICULTURE

Agriculture is a big business. The outlook for its future is always brighter for those who are well equipped with scientific knowledge to solve the problems as they occur. Vocational agriculture is offered by Mr. Bowman to all four grades in high school and to the seventh and eighth grades. Mr. Bowman is director of the 4-H club work, and his students have made a creditable showing of which we are justly proud.

MATHEMATICS


Two semesters of mathematics are required for every freshman. The choice may be made between general mathematics and algebra. Students desiring to continue their study in the "world of figures" may take a course in geometry or advanced algebra. All of these classes are taught by Mrs. Elizabeth Van Liew.

VETERANS' AGRICULTURE


The Veterans' On-Farm-Training program of the Mooresville district was initiated in early February of 1948 when Mr. Wayne Johnson, graduate of the Purdue University School of Agriculture, was chosen as the instructor.

The class of veterans, whose eligibility is determined by the Veterans' Administration and local authorities, meets one night each week for a four-hour class period. In addition to the instruction received in the weekly meetings, each veteran is visited twice a month and advised by Mr. Johnson on individual farm problems.


Additional ground was purchased adjoining the school campus on the west. The grading and construction began in late summer and continued at a rapid pace. After the field and track were in condition, lights were added.

The dedication of the "Memorial Field" was held prior to the Mooresville-Greenwood football game on


October 27. It was a colorful affair with the school and community sharing in the ceremony.


