







The theme of this book is New Dimensions . . . new dimensions of our school helping to further the progress of education to all its people.



Here it was—the new Mooresville High, a modern, spacious, sprawling, brick building. The faint odor of fresh paint and the shiny newness of the entire school held a special and different meaning for the 404 students that first day of school, September 4, 1959.

We were awed by the quietness and newness . . . this was the dream we had looked forward to. Yet, comparisons were made with the old, full of tradition, ivy covered buildings we had left and we grew homesick. Could this coolly, impersonal structure be rought to life and begin to seem like home?

1959-1960 . . . one short year, but what a change was brought to MHS. The empty silent halls now echoed the laughter of the students; the classrooms evidenced each teacher's personality; we grew accustomed to the sound of the buzzer and the fire bell. New traditions were being made for our school.

The new Mooresville Consolidated High School, costing a total of \$703,110.20, was dedicated November 29, 1959. Its true worth, however, is not in its structural soundness but in the purposes for which it will be used. Mr. Warren A. Hert, Superintendent of Schools, expressed his feelings in this way: "May this building, and the facilities it provides, be a challenge to each and every student to use it wisely and appreciatively, and, in so doing, to realize the full meaning of the inscription 'ENTER TO LEARN—DEPART TO SERVE'."

Preceding the program the school was open to visitors, who viewed the new school and examined the many student exhibits.





Carroll Selke and Richard Short were crowned Queen and King of the Prom by junior class officers, Don Adams and Sandra Davis.


Vic Knight's "Squires" furnished the music for the evening.

After the recessional, seniors formed a reception line around the gymnasium to receive congratulations from parents and friends.






Solemn, yet excited, seniors marched down the hall for Baccalaureate, May 22, 1960.

LONG-RANGE PLANNING DONE BY SCHOOL BOARD AND ADMINISTRATION

SPARK INTEREST IN LANGUAGE DEPARTMENTS




The Latin class studied the lives of the Romans, their language, and the various gods and goddesses. Maps and pictures on the bulletin board displayed the ancient Roman life.



The Spanish language and customs are made real to those in this foreign language class. In their work they often used the helpful dictaphone which enabled them to better learn the Spanish language.



Spacious wooden closets surround two of the three rooms and are used to accomodate the clothing and other work materials of the students. All new blond sewing machines make work easier for the seamstress. Another useful area for the sewing department is the fitting room with its large mirrors. The kitchen space is divided into individual units, each containing cabinets, a sink, and a stove. A dinette set and a refrigerator complete the kitchen area.


PUPILS LEARN PRACTICAL APPLICATION OF SKILLS

In agriculture class high school boys learn farming procedures they will need to become farmers in the future. With their competent learning, these boys test soil fertility by using various chemicals.


PHYSICAL EDUCATION INSTRUCTORS STRESS HEALTH








The Junior Band is directed by Mr. Craven. It is made up of students from the 6th as well as the 7th grade. Eighth grade band students have been a part of the senior band this year.
