## Foreword

Progress means to improve or advance toward perfection, or to a higher state. In the last century, our school has grown from a small brick academy to a consolidated corporation. Within the pages of this book we will show you a CENTURY OF PROGRESS.
In 1860 the Friends Church constructed at the cost of $\$ 4,500$ a brick academy at the west edge of town. It was more of a college preparatory school than a public school.
The Civil War drew a large number of men students to arms and the progress of the institution of learning was curbed to such an extent during the war that in 1868 the academy was sold to the town for $\$ 5,000$. The academy building is still in use as a part of the junior high buildings.

In the same year that the academy was purchased, the town became an independent school district. Harrison Hubbard was the first principal under the new arrangement and was assisted by Isaac Jones and Emma Clawson as teachers.
Today Mooresville Consolidated School Corporation consists of five elementary schools, a junior high and a senior high school. The system has a teaching staff of 77 teachers and 5 principals.
Tremendous progress has been shown this past century, 1861-1961. As you turn through these pages seeing what you are doing today, it is my hope that you think ahead to the future and help plan for progress for tomorrow.
May the start you receive here keep you moving forward to another CENTURY OF PROGRESS.

Mooresvillians were proud of their new high school and they showed it by publishing the first catalogue in 1861-62.

The new high school opened in 1861 with 78 students and two teachers. Ninety-one seniors made up the 77 th graduating class this year. There were 517 students enrolled in the high school with 28 teachers in 1961.

English, mathematics, Latin and Greek made up the Course of Study in 1861. Today the curriculum includes English, mathematics, science, Latin, Spanish, social studies, business, vocational home economics, vocational agriculture, industrial arts, art, and music.

Our increased curriculum of today tries to meet the many varied needs of all the 517 students.

Ringing of the old school bell in 1861 told the students that they now had the opportunity to go ahead in education. Seventy-eight pupils attended the first school, consisting of a two-room building and taught by two teachers.

As was expected, enrollment grew rapidly and 50 years later, 1911, there were 93 students enrolled in the high school at Mooresville. .

In 1961, 2,292 students were enrolled in the consolidation at the end of the first six-weeks' grading period. 517 of these were high school students and 442 were junior high students.

CENTURY OF PROGRESS
. . . in Your Town


In 1824, Samuel Moore founded the town of Mooresville. He had been operating a trading store in this area and drew many white people and Indians from many miles. By 1826 the Indians fulfilled the terms of their contract with the Government and moved on.

The town grew rapidly and by 1832 its population reached 200. Mooresville received its first serious setback in 1842 , when a disastrous fire raged through the town leaving only one store and one dwelling house, both of which were owned by Samuel Moore. Work of reconstruction was started immediately and the town was soon resplendent with the new homes and stores virtually reared out of the ashes.

Business seemed to pour into Mooresville and in 1872 a savings bank was established to meet the demands of increased business. A year later it was named the Farmers Bank and boasted a capital of $\$ 30,000$. The building of the Indianapolis and Martinsville traction line in 1903 started a "boom" that raised Mooresville from a town of 900 to a thriving little city of approximately 1,800 within two years.

This year, 1961, Mooresville covered an area of approximately 1,450 acres and had an approximate population of 4,000 with some 200 business establishments.
