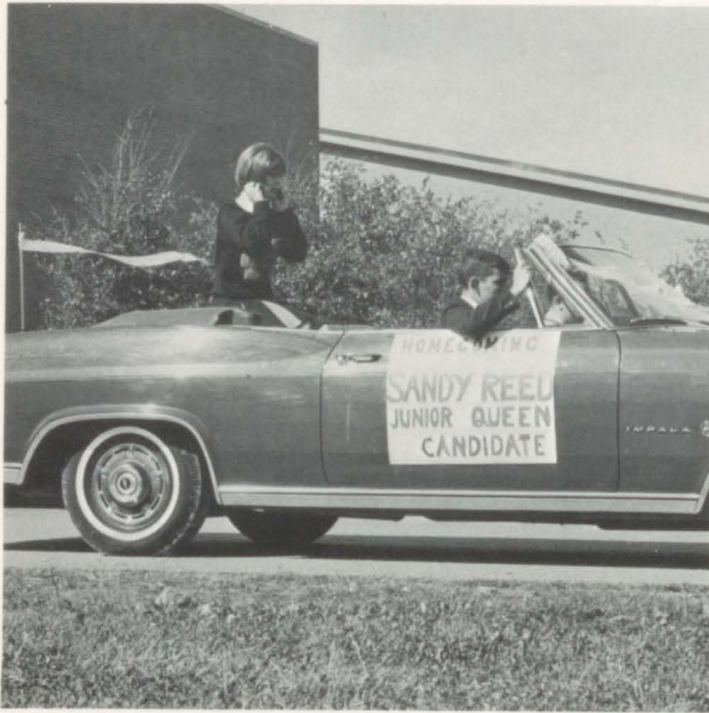

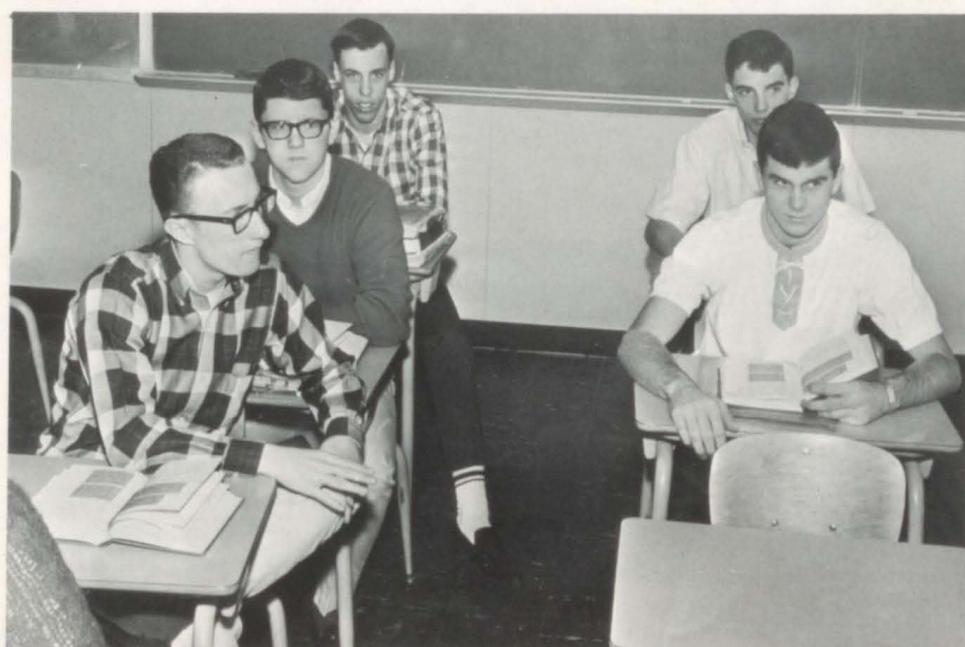

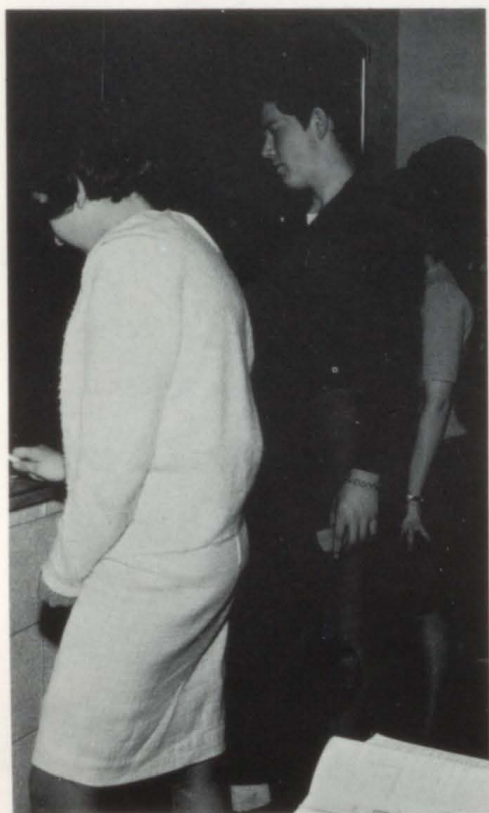

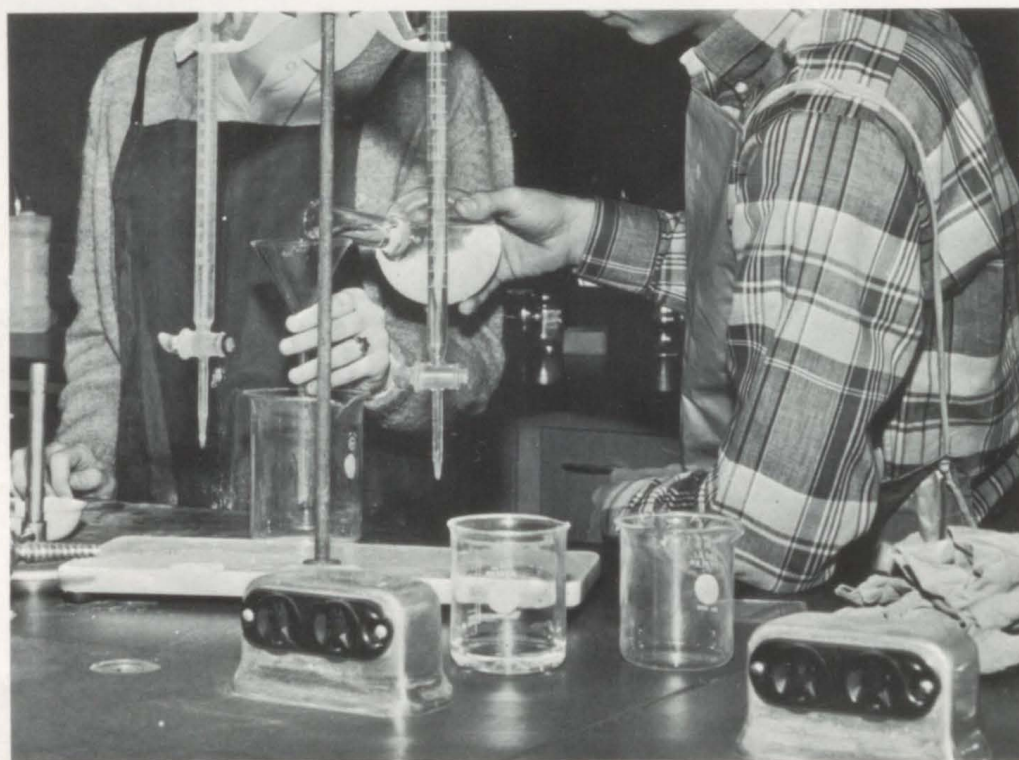

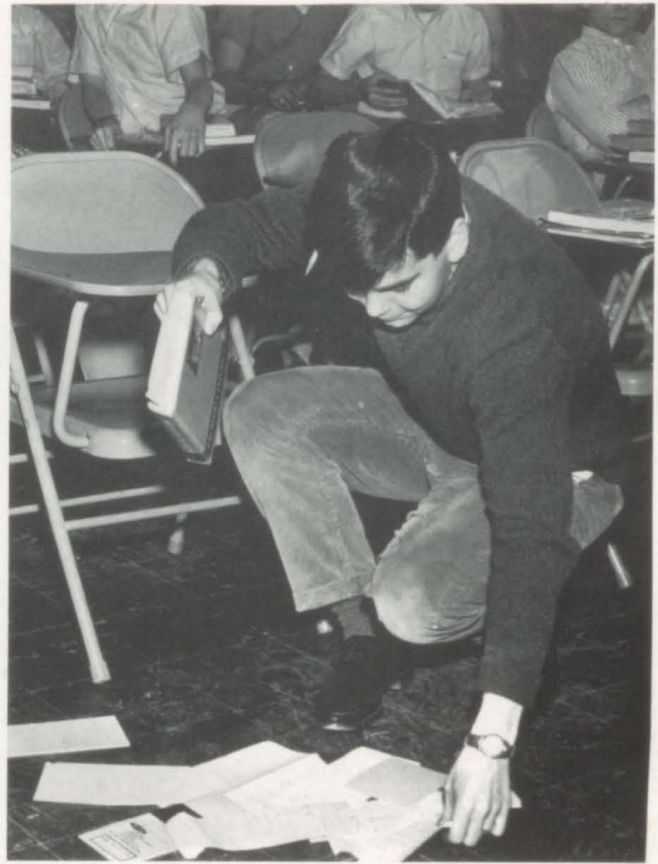

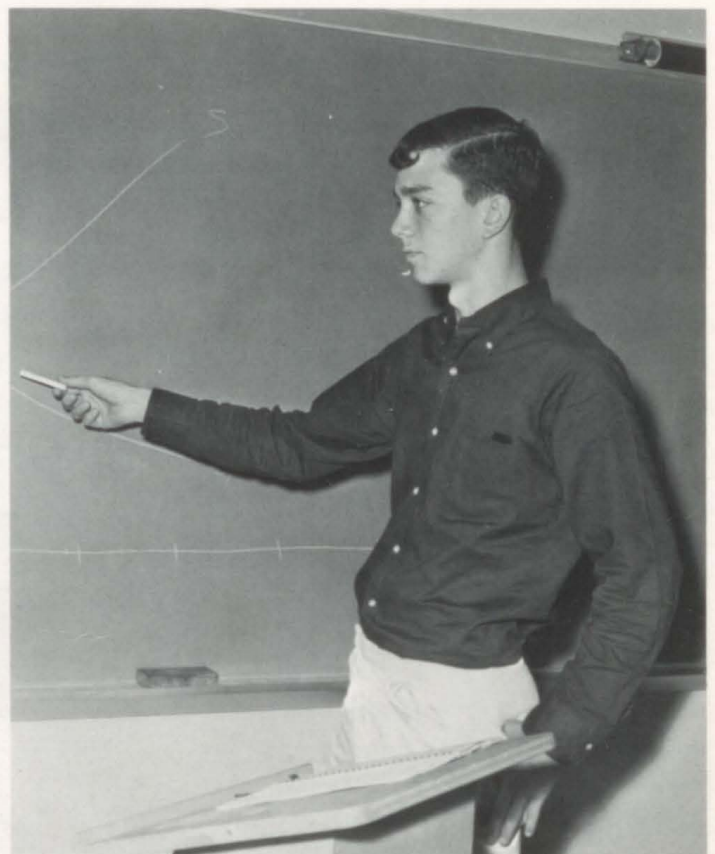

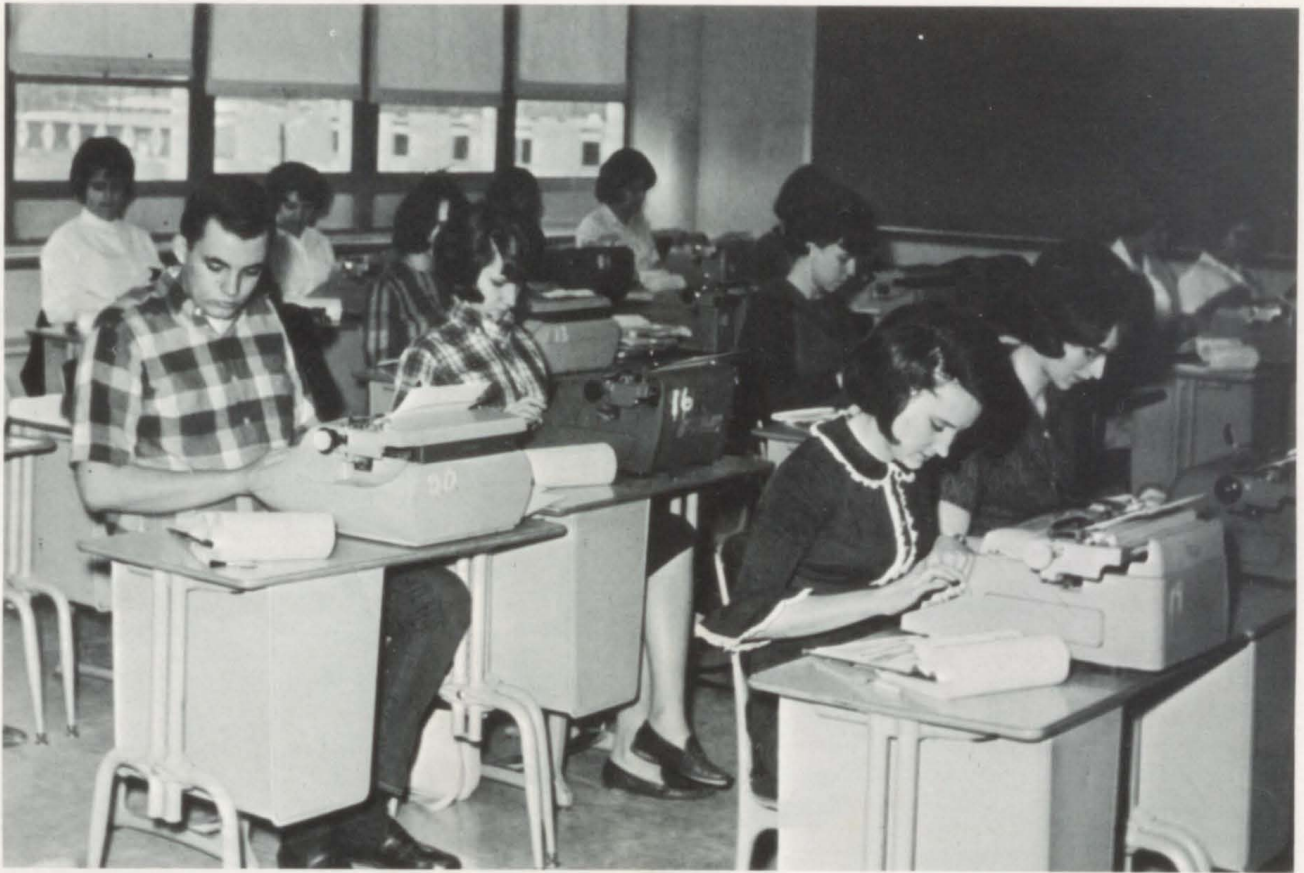

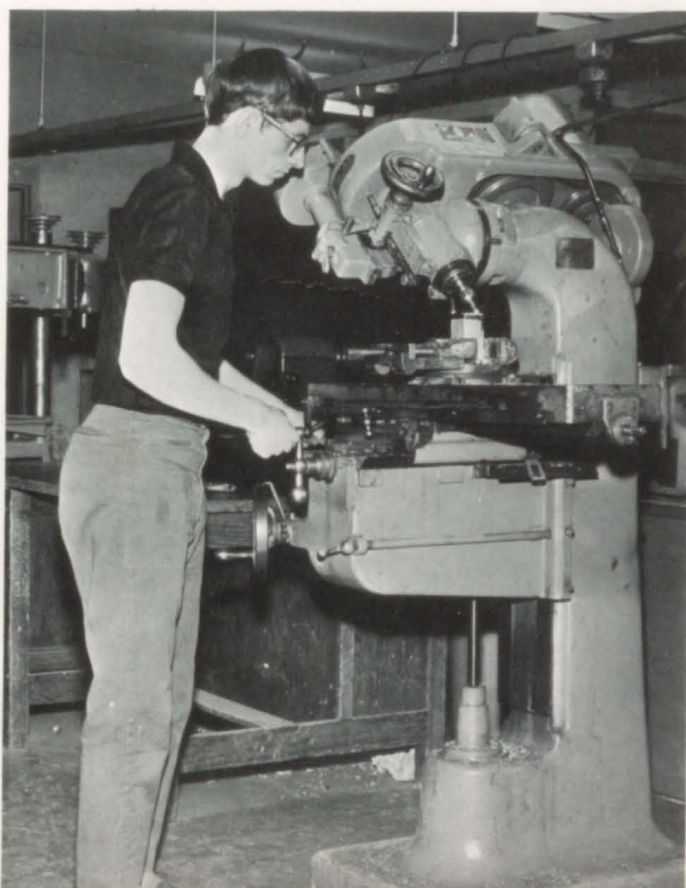

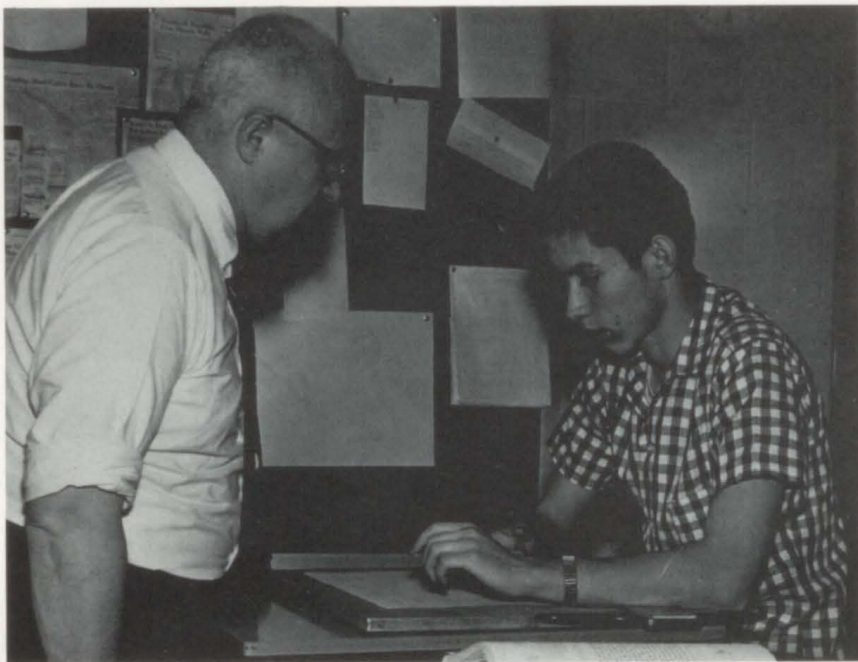

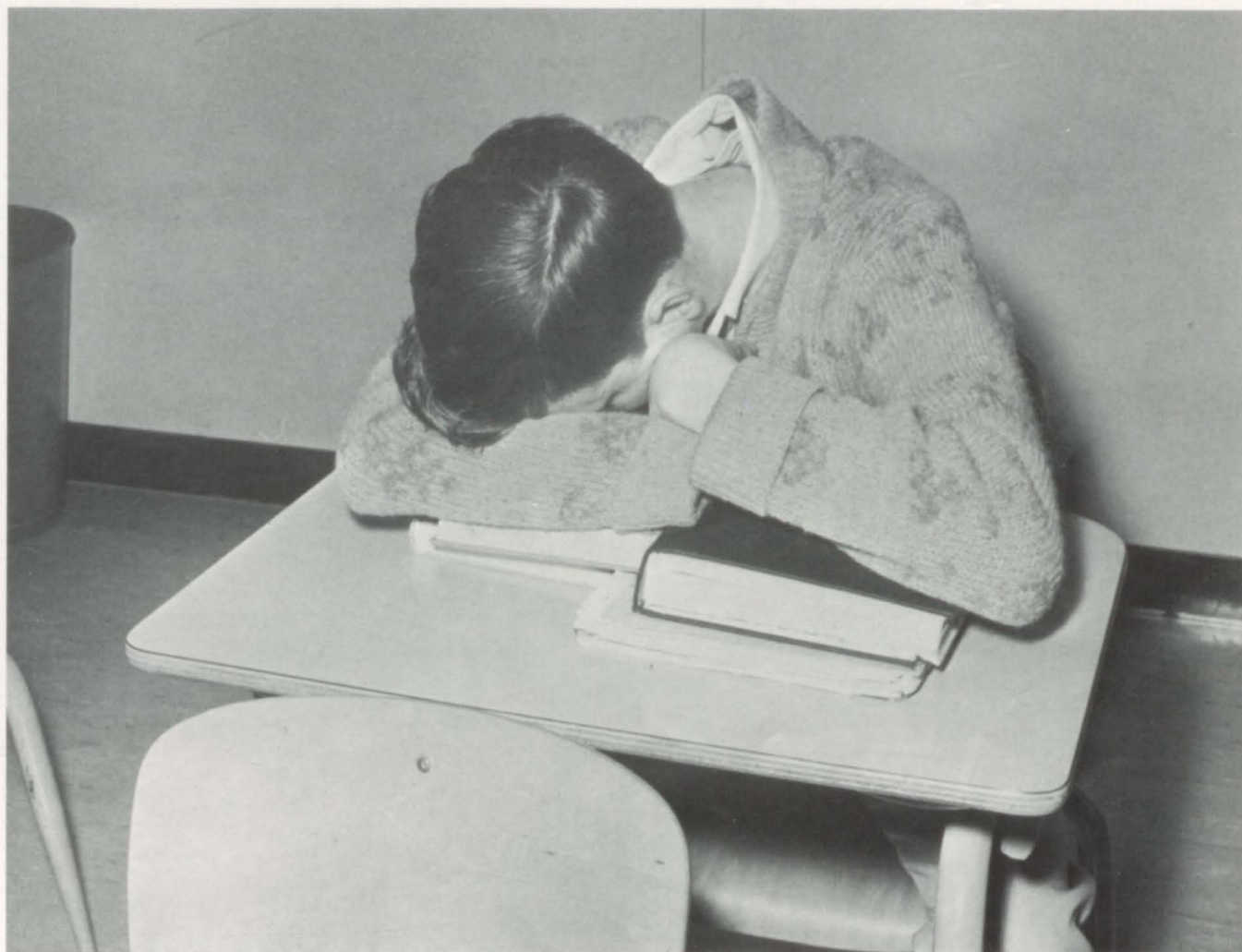

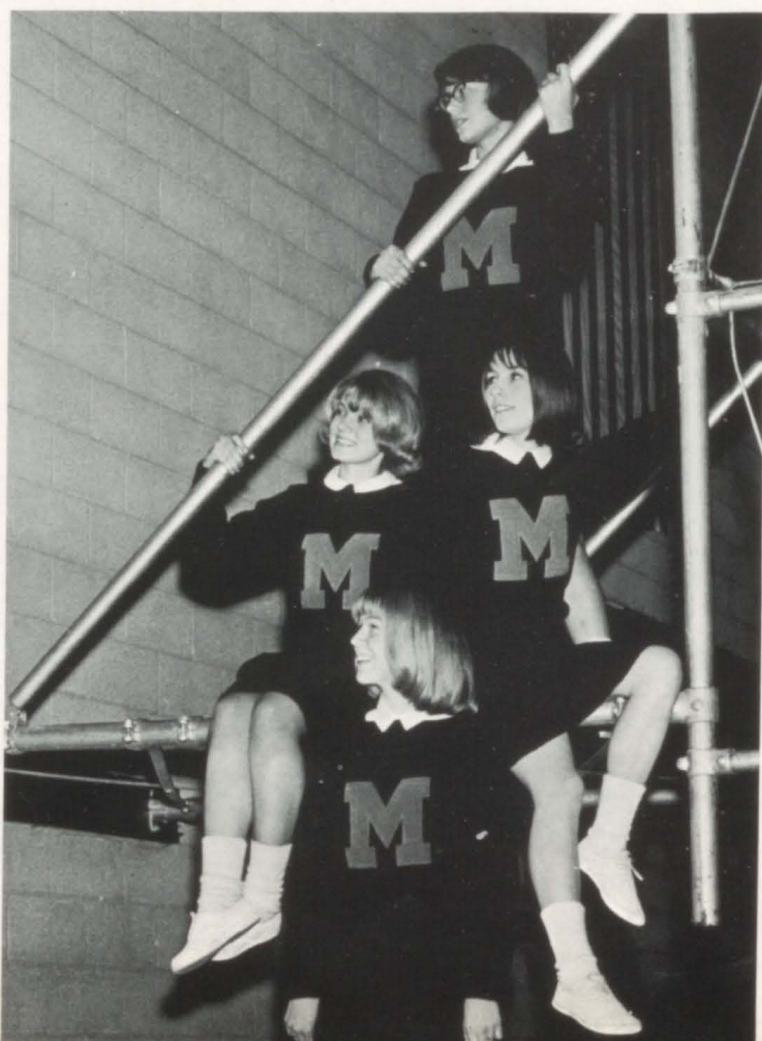

This hard work and determination brought Mooresville High School its best football season in 22 years.



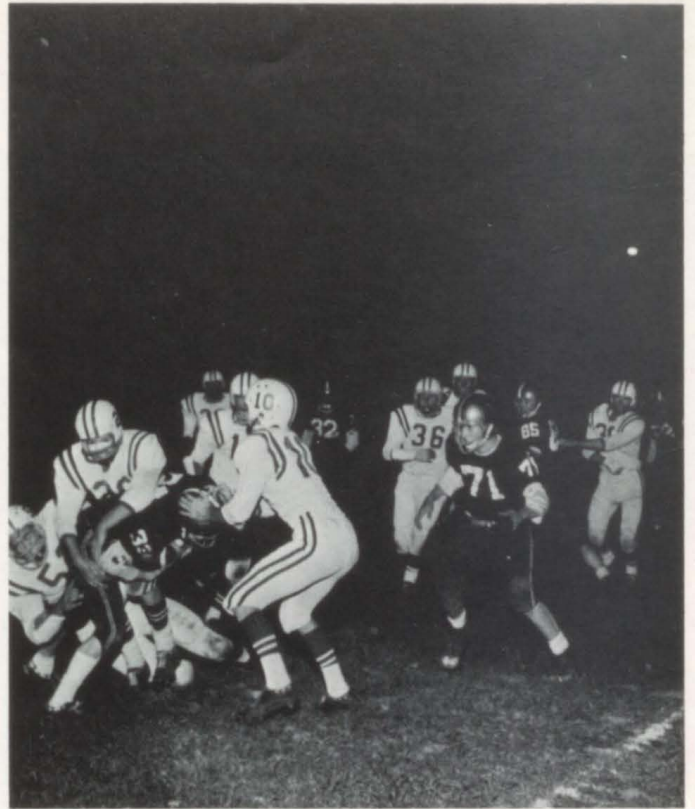

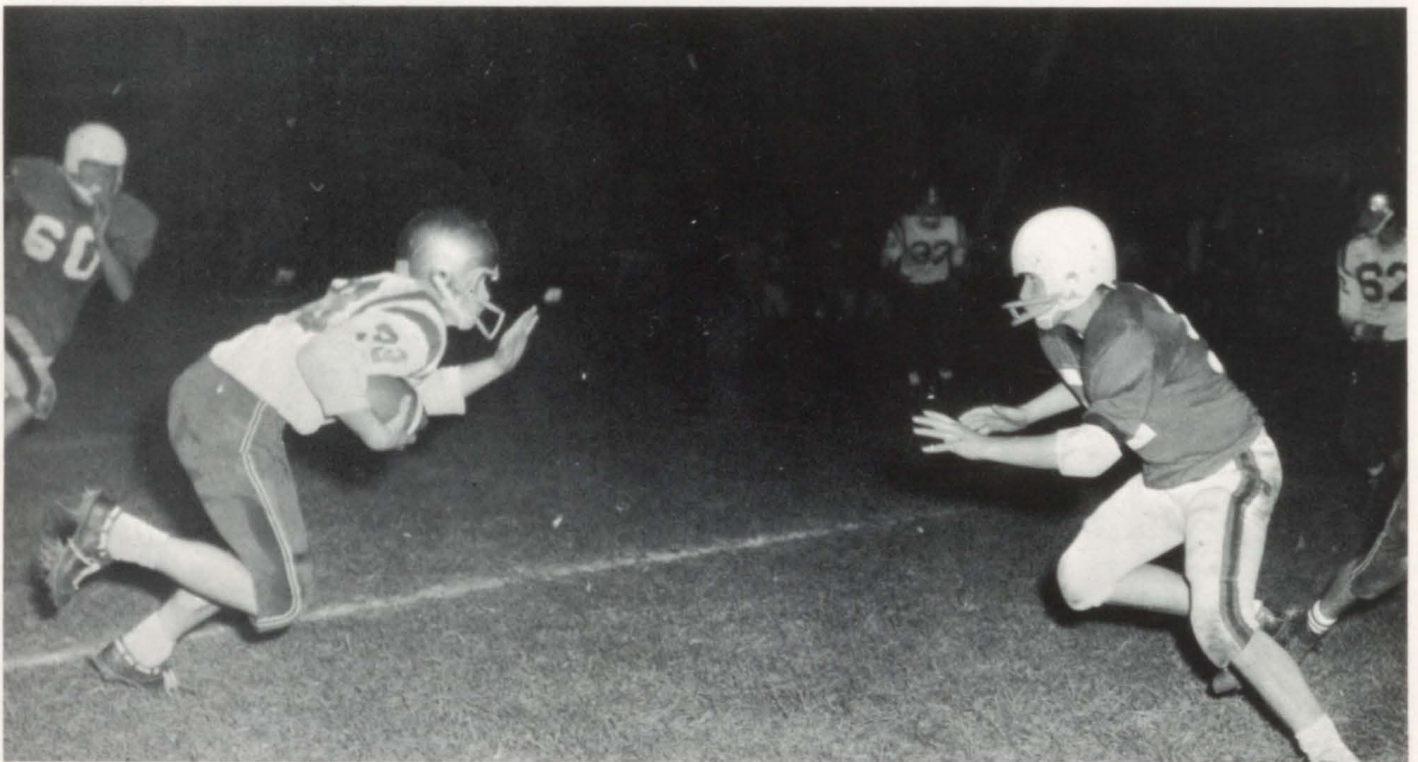

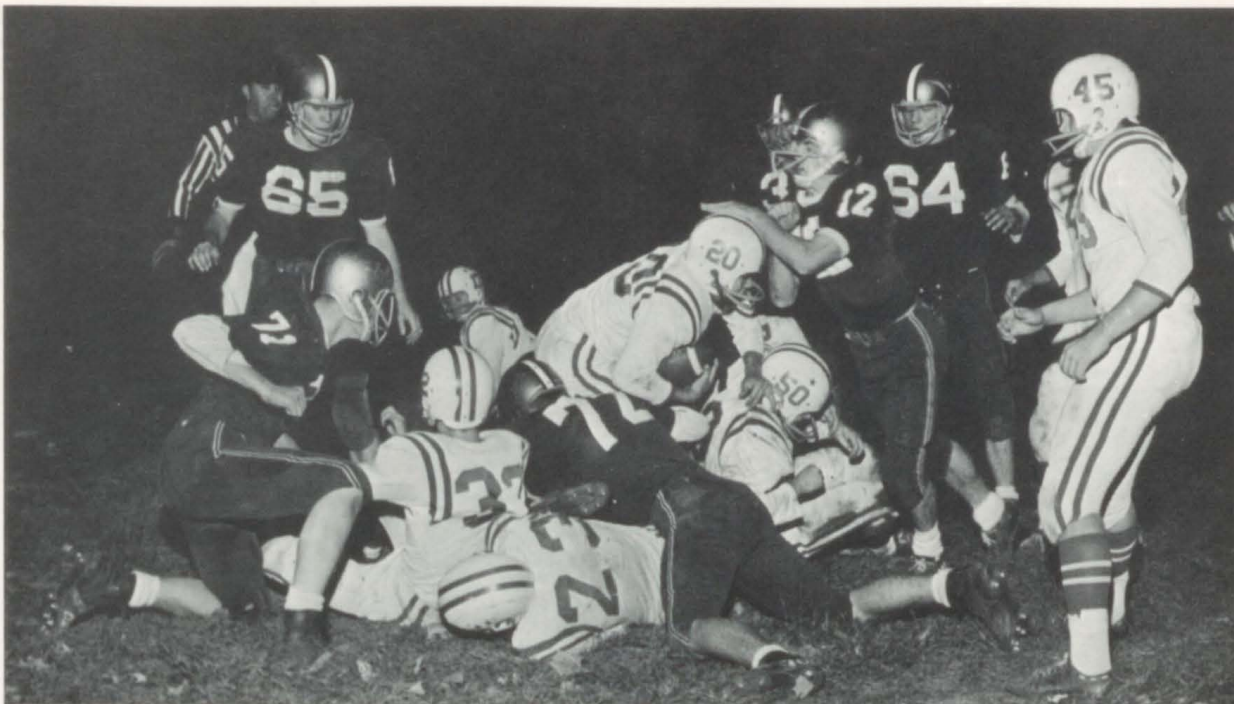

From that first match, the team went on to place 5th in the tough Columbus Invitational Meet and another 5th in the Mid-State Conference Meet.

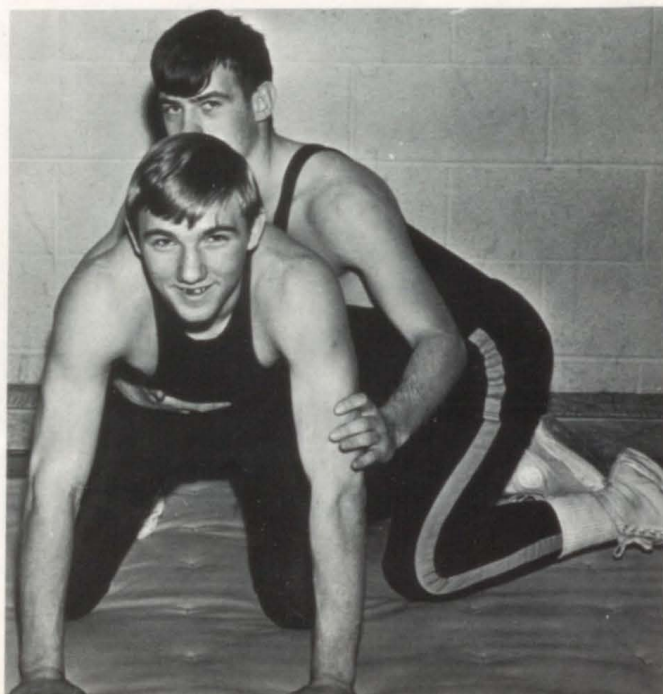

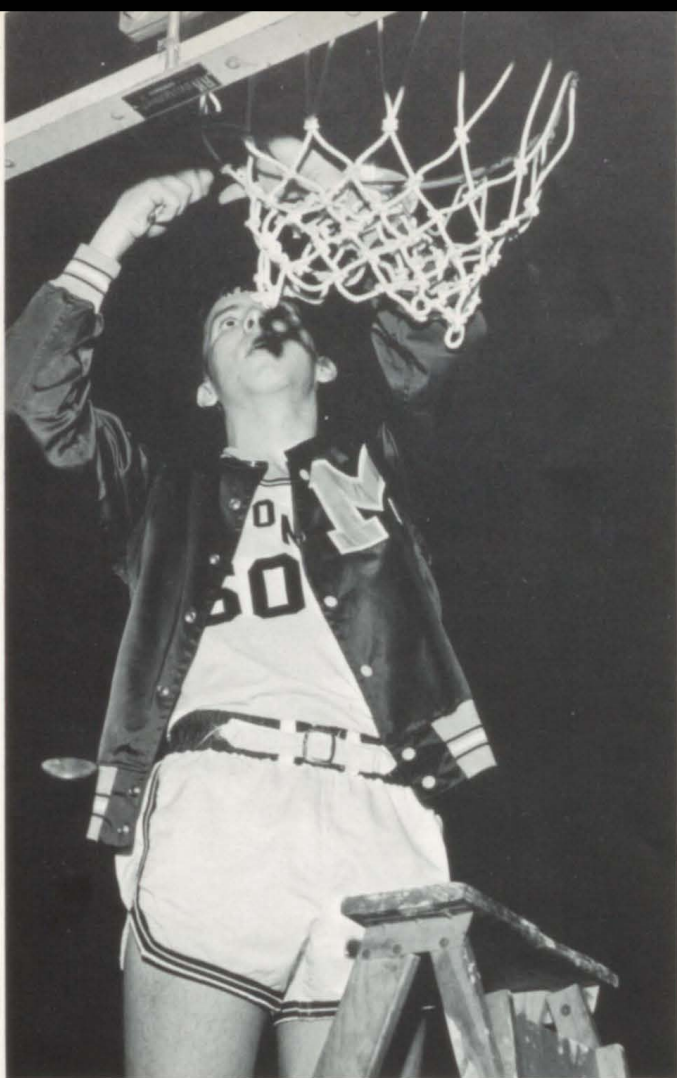

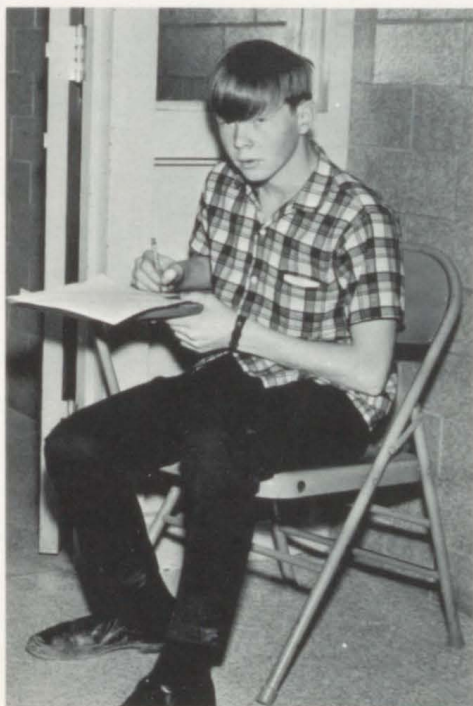
