## Public Speakers, Reporters

Students in the Language Arts Department enjoyed something different from the everyday classroom schedules. English, Literature, and Composition classes saw a variety of different films this year. ## Composers, Musicians

Varsity Choir started having a pre-Christmas sale of Christmas goods in December. Along with the Girl's Glee Club, they sang at Lafayette Square during the afternoon of December 14 and sang on the Circle that evening. On December 17, the choirs of MHS gave a Christmas concert in the gym. On January 27, 64 solos and 5 ensemble participated in the district contest. Twenty-three of the 64

Driving with drugs and a crash driving course at the GM Testing Center were examples of films showed during the first three weeks of Drivers' Training. Driving students led discussions, worked worksheets, and gave reports on these subjects.

Driving groups consisted
of 3 people and 4 groups in each class. These groups drove to Plainfield, Martinsville, Indianapolis, and towns in surrounding counties. Driving ability, as well as the classroom average, was an important factor for students who were wavered. They obtained a B+ average in both. One hun-
dred thirty-two students took Drivers' Ed during the school year and 264 during the summer.
