150 years from now Mooresville will have changed even more, but we'll always remember growing from BUGGIES to BAGGIES.









Congressman Dave Evans visited MHS. He spoke to government students and answered questions.


The U.S. History class paid close attention as Mr. D. Adams recited a daily lecture.



Ceramics was one of many areas of study in Art, in which students could develop their talents.




Senior Greg Whitaker spent much time creating pottery vases in art and made over forty pieces last year.

Another art class was jewelry. Pat Murray chose this class and exhibits his talent of making a ring.


## BUILDIN'


This sophomore seemed confident in her spotter during one of the more difficult vaults in her gym class.

Students studied many areas of health. They learned methods of emergency first aid including treatment of shock, broken bones, and minor sprains.











The cars used by MHS had automatic transmissions and dual control brakes.


This class was offered during the summer and many students found summer classes more convenient than during the school year.

Journalism is an elective in the English department. All kinds of mass media are studied. The class may be taken for one year and is a prerequisite for paper staff.






1974-75 Reserve Wrestling Team

The tri-captains for the season were Racic, DeLong and Graham.







Coach Hamm had fifteen lettermen on his team last year, which sparked them to this fine record.







A silky golden yarn attatched the feathered bullet to my hand, And so my arrow took the moon and the lifeless planet was now my land.


