

## "Speeding" through 1978-79





coach Steve Hilligoss. First year coach Hilligoss was assisted by Joel Beebe.



### Success sums up Frosh season


"This is the most rewarding season I have ever had," stated Coach Greg Silver. The team started out slowly but came back and won five and tied one of their last six games.


Rodney Walker, and the 7th runner, Darwin Stannard, came through for the team at very crucial times.


Coach Peters knew the team's major weakness — experience.



The 78-79 reserve basketball team jumped to a good start by successfully defending the Mooresville reserve tourney crown.




Whitaker said, "It was a

were able to equal last year's performance. We did the unexpected!"




### 20-1 season shattered at Semi-State







# Track is 9-5; Jerin makes regionals


The track season started in February with practice again being hampered by snow. As March approached, about seventy boys were out for the team.






LeeAnn Hadley won the #2 singles title to help gain the team a 3rd place finish at the Bloomington Tourney. The team had much luck once again at the Mid-State





### Field show and concert seasons bring firsts as band competes in school, state events

The Pioneer band kept busy all year. Marching season began with a trip to Michigan City on July 1 to march in the city's annual parade and to view a drum and bugle corps contest. For recreation, the band members swam in Lake Michigan, but a change in the weather left many swimmers shivering on the beach. August 6, the band was a participant in the Old Settler's Parade, followed by the Homecoming parade in September and the Martinsville Fall Foliage parade in October.

Beginning in early August, during which time the band attended camp at Manchester College, and continuing throughout the fall months, the Pioneers practiced diligently, always looking toward the forthcoming contests. September 31 was the Kokomo Invitational with the band placing 5th in Class A. Jackie Even captured the "best drum major" award.

The members returned home victorious from the Charleston Invitational with a 1st place trophy

in Class AAA small, scoring 87.5 from a possible 100 and becoming the ninth best band competing that day. Placing 2nd overall in Class A, the band was only 5 points behind Anderson in district competition at Lebanon. An amazing 33.2 of 35 points put the band ahead of all the other bands in playing points.

The 1st division rating advanced the Pioneers to state competition at Terre Haute on October 28. where the band took 13th place from 27 of Indiana's top bands. Long time rival, Martinsville, placed 16th, 5.4 points behind the smiling Pioneers. About the scores, director Gerald Weber said that they were, "a little disappointing. The scores were a little lower than we'd thought compared to district. We'll just have to try harder next year."

The largest number of Mooresville band students in the history of the instrumental department participated in district solo and emsemble contest at Decatur on February 3. There were 21 soloists and 3 ensembles bringing



home 14 1st place ratings. Paul McKinney was the only soloist to qualify for state competition. Concert band contest on April 28 at Greenwood was the band's last competition of the year. They received 1st place rating in group II.


In addition to competition, the band played at pep sessions, ballgames, concerts, and graduation. The dance band also performed during the year.

The band parents association supported the band throughout the year by cheering, altering uniforms, and selling elephant ears at a WIRE picnic at Raceway Park.

Mr. Weber summed up his feelings for the year saying, "Through continued hard work, we've grown and progressed during the year."

### Corps performs for State All-Star games









# Drama Club presents varied productions


Senior club member Jeff Brinkmann summed up the purpose of Drama Club when he said it gave people the chance to "experience theatre and survey their capabilities."



"Lease a Yard" is big Science Club event




# First year Ski Club takes overnight ski trip to Michigan City


















The English Department offered several variations of the standard grammar, literature, and composition studies in 1979 including an exciting new course in creative writing taught by Mrs. Terry Crowe.

























# Mathematicians formulate numerous problems The Math Department, headed by Mr.




