
While some hope the answers to those questions are "yes" so they will be known as the class clown, others only have this though: "Thank goodness for retakes."




Burning Up for Jonas

He studied the TV/Radio fields, and it really changed the way he feels about his future. "It really made me reconsider what I would do when I graduated," Petty said.




"Saturday is modern music, and Sunday I play oldies," Petty said.


"It took two to three hours to drive down there and then the exploring took another two to three hours," Ross said.

As culture goes, my favorites are probably a tie between Jordan and Saudi. They're very similar, warm and caring. They're one big family. My favorite country I guess is Dubai (UAE), because it's a mixture of Middle East and Western traditions.

America differs how? America is sort of set on this pedestal by other countries, so people look at it like that. But really, it's not that much different than other places. BEHIND the scenes

The 50th Anniversary of the Facilities at 550 N. Indiana Street

Cracking walls, broken or missing ceiling tiles, inoperational exit signs and faulty electrical wiring. When a 50-year-old facility that was built before the dawn of the earliest personal computers was used for educational purposes, including curriculum-involving computers, many problems occurred.

curriculum-involving computers, many problems occurricul Problems like these, along with the Mooresville's expanse of growth at the time - prompted the school board to build the current facilities. On November 29, 1959, the current facility opened its doors. It promised features such as fluorescent lighting, tile ceilings, and green chalkboards - all relatively new and unheard of in 1959. The total cost of the facility: \$703,119.20.

"Let us remember that good schools are not cheap, and it may be well that education is not cheap either," then-Principal William R. Curry said. "In supplying better educational facilities for our people, we are supplying a better chance of better living."

In the past few years, students have made some observations about the building's state.

"The roof was leaking in our yearbook room," senior Jacob Ligh said. "A lot of the rain that came through the roof got into some computers. Mrs. [Ada] Clark barely had enough time to stop class, run to the other side of the room and move them before they were permanently damaged."

"I went to my locker one day, and it was flooded because it had rained in my locker," senior Anastasia Bovee said. "I still don't understand how rain got into my locker - on the first floor, no less."

The current facilities lived up to expectations until the school reached 110 percent of its functional capacity. During the 2008-2009 school year, the school board decided it would be reasonable to put forth a community vote for a building project.

The project, slated to cost \$96 million, would include renovations to the current facilities and a new middle school. Upon the completion of the middle school's construction, the middle school building would become a part of the high school.

A plan didn't come without opposition before the vote, however. Several community members argued that a new building project would raise property taxes and cause local businesses to permanently close their doors.

 On May 19, 2009, the final vote was tallied. As a result of the vote, the motion for renovations and construction was not passed.

"Some kids find it tough at first to work with metals, but as they use it more, it becomes easier for them," Mr. Amrhein said.


Some of the first projects for the class include shaping names from a piece of wire and making basic chains. As the year progressed, such chains become more extravagant.


Wells says that the team's record is not the greatest, but he still enjoys playing.







"I've been to every spring play [with Stephanie Langenderfer], and they are always good. This one was very funny and entertaining," senior Shelby Auler said.







MHS Auto students receive top honors at State Competition.

The auto department prepared throughout the year for the 2009 Ford/AAA Student Auto Skills Competition. The competition took place on February 25 and only accepted the top automotive schools as competitors. In the second semester of

auto, the class took a written test and the top two scores were added together to qualify for the competition. Each test consisted of 50 questions in all areas of automotive.

"The written test is like our Regionals," Mr. Rich Kelley said.

Their combined score was high enough to place in the top 10 of all high schools in Indiana. This is the sixth time Mooresville has competed in the competition. The two students, Mooresville Graduate Rusty Graham and senior Dennis Nelson, advanced to the hands-on competition, each of the 10 teams received a car that had a different problem, and it was up to the team to figure it out. Whichever team fixed the car first won the overall state competition. The prize included a \$1000 scholarship.

Although Pike Central came out on top, Mooresville's very own took

third place.

In the auto industry, each aspiring mechanic had to pass eight automotive tests. These tests, however, were not easy and two Mooresville High

School students passed one test each. Graham passed the test specializing in brakes, and Nelson became certified in basic engine.

"It's a big deal to pass an automotive test," Kelley said.

"Receiving this scholarship will allow me to pursue my college education without having to worry about working a lot or paying off a bunch of loans in the future," Outcalt said.


> Criteria for the scholarship is weighted and based on academic performance, financial need, school and community activities, essay questions, a personal interview, personal characteristics and work experience.



to say that if you are yourself and you don't care what others think of you, can obtain a 'free spirit' and have even more fun."


Seniors Chris Parsons and Bailey Tri were named Prom King and Queen.

Prom was an important and special night for all those who attended.



The prizes and refreshments were crowd pleasers for many.


"My favorite part about post prom was the food, especially the White Castles," junior Joe Neely said.

"The competition is a reward for the students at the end of the year to show off all their hard work," Mrs. Sheryl Fyffe said.


















As We Go On The graduating class looks towards the future, but won't forget the past.

"I feel like high school went by too fast and I'm going to miss it, especially soccer," Ryan Skora said. "Make the most out of high school, be involved and enjoy life."


Adam Hakes' speech was based on enjoying what is front of you and having fun along the way.
