

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

"Hanging out, dressing up, and making posters out of popcorn boxes to make fun of other teams is what I do," Gill said.


Athletics, clubs, and any other extracurricular activities seemed to be the biggest parts of school that students enjoyed to celebrate.


For cheerleaders, Homecoming was a great deal of work. They had to decorate the lockers for the football players, and they got everyone excited for the game.


"I loved theme this year. Everyone was really into it and it was a lot of fun!" junior Ellie Ciasto said.



Yearbook editor Samantha Perry witnessed a horrifying experience while on Atlantis Beach. Below is her story.

Waking up, senior Courtney Casteel thought it could be a day filled with fun and excitement, but little did she know she would be fighting for her life against the Nassau waves.

Walking off the cruise ship the smell of salt filled the air.

Courtney followed closely behind her group, cramming as many people possible onto a ferry boat to travel to Atlantis.

Along the beach front natives asked Courtney to try their drinks, buy their shirts, and use their chairs, but what they didn't tell her was how dangerous the beach really was.

The waves splashed high and crashed into the sand hard. Crowded with adults and kids, the beach allowed for a fun time. The waves filled the beach scooting everyone back to keep their belongings dry.

Unknown to Courtney, lifeguards patrolled the area as they told one part of the beach to stay out of the ocean because of the life threatening waves. Courtney set out to have a fun experience. She and a friend walked down to the waves.

The first wave came and knocked Courtney off her feet; she laughed. Before she could get on her feet, the next wave knocked her face first in the sand. Wave after wave hit Courtney, sucking her back into the ocean. The fun and laughter stopped. Her friends and family saw that she was in trouble and needed help.

With no lifeguard in sight, Brian Bantley went to help as he saw

her gasping for air. Grabbing onto her hand Brian, held on trying to pull her out of the waves, but they ended up pulling him into the water. Brian, beginning to drown, had to let go of Courtney.

Seeing Brian now let go and Courtney scream for help, Brent Perry ran down the beach into the waves straight to help. Brent grabbed onto Courtney holding her as she tried to hold on, gasping for air. With absolutely no fight left in her, Courtney held on and hoped he could pull her to safety.

With the waves crashing into Brent and Courtney, there was no way he can get her up to safety by himself. He then yelled for anyone to come help get Courtney to safety. Just down the beach, a man saw what was happening and ran to help. With four men now holding onto Courtney, they finally pulled her to safety.

"Jumping in to save Courtney was the only thing on my mind. She is like my daughter and when I saw her in trouble I didn't think twice but to go in and save her. The waves were hard and I wasn't about to let her go back into the water if I had to drag her out myself." Brent Perry said.

Courtney sat on the beach chair, bawling. Scared from the life threatening waves, Courtney regained her breath learning of a death that occurred the day before. After swallowing what seemed to be a gallon of saltwater, she took a cold water bottle and chugged the fresh water in order to get the salt taste out of her mouth

She recalled her experience with a local who said this was the worst the waves had been in a while.

"The waves looked fun, there were kids and adults in the waves just down the beach from me so when I went in I didn't think anything of it." Casteel said. "All I saw was water, I couldn't catch my breath because the waves were so strong. I really didn't think I was going to make it."

Terrified from the event that occurred Courtney later looked back and recalled her chilling experience.

"If was just a joke, but every joke has some truth behind it, and that is why Decatur got mad," Redelman said.




"My most memorable moment was when the first slow song came on - Michael got on his knee and asked me if I would marry him. I remember everyone in a circle around us," Murdock said.



Children who were young, elementary school students when the World Trade Center fell, and the Pentagon burned, have matured into high school or college students. When the news came that Bin Laden was found, it was those same students who felt relieved, on that Monday morning, in May.

"When they announced that they had found Bin Laden, I felt a sense of relief knowing that justice was served," senior Joey Swisher said.

One normal Friday afternoon during seventh period, the fire alarm sounded. Many thought it was only a drill, until fire trucks and police came in from every direction. There was a "burning" odor near the construction rooms.

"I left all my stuff in my class, then the fire trucks arrived, and I knew it was serious. The thought of not seeing my lucky lunch box again frightened me," freshman Brent Walker said.

Students began to get frustrated when they were standing outside and rain drops were dropping on their heads. Firefighters searched the building and discovered a haze beginning to form, the situation was corrected, and students were allowed back into the building. The students were required to stay in the building until administration released them. They were held about 15 minutes after school.

The Friday before spring break, while students finished up their last minute homework and test. Mooresville was notified of a

shooting. Just outside Mooresville, a student of West Middle School in Martinsville shot another student in the stomach, twice. The victim, who was identified by police as a 15-year-old boy, was taken by LifeLine helicopter to Methodist Hospital for treatment, where he underwent surgery. At MHS, students operated under a Code Yellow, which meant they were on alert.

"I was freaking out man, I mean the whole school was freaking out. I took cover when the code yellow went into effect," sophomore Jessica Juliano said.

The suspect was found shortly after and taken into custody. All Morgan County schools were on a code yellow lock down for the rest of the day. When students returned from spring break, a "high alert" remained in effect for about a week.


On March 11, 2011 a devastating earthquake struck the nation of Japan. The epicenter was located 45 miles off the coast of the Oshika Peninsula, and 232 miles from Tokyo, Japan's capital.

"The best way to be prepared for an earthquake is to be educated about them," Q-crew sponsor Mr. Jim Lindsey said. "With education we can develop better engineering for buildings and other structures."

Along with a difference in clothing taste, Loren often wore her hair in unique styles that were not typically seen.




In the end, students experienced a year filled with new memories and new friendships that no matter how many miles apart they are from each other, with technology, they could stay in touch.


"What's different from MHS from my school in Moldova, we don't change classrooms. We stay in the same room all the time with some people of one grade," Anastasia Strelnicova said.

The team was hopeful and looked forward to the new change to see how the season would turn out. One of the team's fondest memories was bonding together every Friday Night. All the guys left everything on the field.


The team ended with a record of three wins and five losses. When Mooresville reflected back on the season, it remembered the dedication, determination, and the adrenalin from the entire varsity team.

"The freshman had a good learning experience," said freshman Blaine Stanley.


As the season ended the boys thought forward about years to come on the MHS football team.

They ended up placing third at the competition which was the best the squad had done all year. They also had two All-Conference Athletes, Haleigh Richardson and Jaimee McQueen.







"One thing I can say is I am proud. I am proud of them," Coach Beam said.



"I think one thing that we achieved was more team support," Coach Zach Errett said.




The boys showed what they had learned on the field by scoring runs and playing good defense with the chances they had to play.






Aric showed early that he would be an essential piece to the MHS Track program by setting the record for the 100 in middle school. As a freshman, he finished fifth 100 at Regionals. Last season, Aric qualified for the state indoor meet at Purdue, he was the sectional and regional champion in the 100, and the anchor leg of the sectional champion 4x100 relay. 




Students also had their opinion on the new academic changes. "I think it just puts a whole bunch of stress on everybody," junior Autumn Schmitz said.

Even though Schmitz thought it was a stressful new year, other thought otherwise.





"The movies in Earth/Space Science were pretty entertaining," senior Kiersten Taylor said.


Classes such as Anatomy, Biology 2, Physics, and Chemistry were designed to be more advanced science courses. Students usually took these as additions after their other science credits had been completed

"I like my social studies class. I learn a lot and l'enjoy the intelligent atmosphere," junior Michael Christian said.


The Social Studies teachers aimed to make their class time enjoyable, fun, and interesting.





"I don't think ECA is a good idea, because we already take a lot of tests," sophomore Taylor Groce said.


ECA is a good idea but it should not reflect the teachers. It's all on the students if we pass it or not," freshman Maddy Cooper said.

To expand beyond the average drawing or painting class, students were also offered such classes as jewelry and photography.


"I wanted to take 2D Art, because I wanted to take photography, but I'm just going to stick with digital photography and take yearbook instead," freshman Maddie Cooper said.







"Computer applications will help you in every job that you could have," Kirsten Fleenor said.


Some students chose to take these classes to help them in business careers.


"I took this class to learn how to effectively use Microsoft Word and Microsoft Excel, "sophomore Jordan Arick said.

"It feels good to be a new Finesse member," sophomore Tori Hoffman said.






All Spads members would agree that they were a family, seniors would be missed, and returning members couldn't wait for years to come.




Madrigals was an a cappella chamber choir, songs they sang included "O Magnum Mysterium," "There is a Flower," and "Elijah Rock."


These choirs were all amazing, but they would have been what they were without their stage crew. Stage crew members did all the backstage work that it took to get them from start to finish of a show.

Ben Schuck was a four year member, "I started out freshman year and I enjoyed it ever since."


Insomniacs songs were all a Cappella and were normally on a more difficult level than most other choirs.

"I will miss Mr. Damron the most. He was like a father Figure to us all and one of the greatest men I have ever met," Schuck said.






The girls all agreed that they were the best of the best, "We have a lot of musical talent and it really comes out in our vocals," said senior Amy Anderson.



The President of Best Buddies was senior Sarah Lemon, and the Buddy Director of Best Buddies was senior AJ Slatinsky.


"As Best Buddies, Buddy Director, I share ideas and help them plan activities," senior AJ Slatinsky said.

Art Club was a place where students could go to be artistic and have some fun. Many students liked Art Club, because it was so laid back.


"I plan on being in Art Club next year, because it is a lot of fun and it helps me get better at drawing," sophomore Taylor Fiese said.

Won by One has been sponsored by Mr. Burgess for five years.


